In connection with the article on Domicil of the Restatement of the Conflict of Laws, published in the May issue of this review, the editors desire to call particular attention to the following facts.

The Dickinson Law Review, with the permission of the chairman of the Special Committee of the Pennsylvania Bar Association upon the work of the American Law Institute, and Mr. Henry Eastman Hackney of Uniontown, secretary of the Bar Association Special Committee, published Chapter 2 of the Tentative Draft of the Conflict of Laws Restatement with Pennsylvania Annotations.

The text of this chapter was prepared by the Reporter, Joseph H. Beale, and his advisers. It has been submitted to the Institute, but has not been finally adopted, as yet.

The annotations were the work of the Committee of the Pennsylvania Bar Association; and were merely submitted to our readers with a view to criticism and suggestion for its improvement.

The Pennsylvania Bar Association Committee requests that all criticisms and suggestions relative both to the text and to the annotations be sent to Secretary Hackney, at Uniontown, Pennsylvania.

Pamphlets containing the Pennsylvania annotations to the first three re-statements of Contracts (Sections 1 to 177) were distributed at the last meeting of the Pennsylvania Bar Association. The committee still has a few of these pamphlets on hand, and will be glad to send a copy to any member of the Association interested in this subject.
